Scholarship Directories (you complete a profile and enter your email address)

- Visit Franklin's Website frhs.egusd.net and under the "**Our School**" tab choose "**Counseling**" then "**College and Career**" then "**Scholarships**" to view current scholarship list.
- See back of this page for a list of search websites
- Search Engines (in the "search" box, type: Scholarship, _____).
